> But Lisa is optimistic that moving to Denver will be good for Hannah. She will be able to attend the school at the Children's Hospital and learn alongside kids with the same kind of medical and emotional struggles. She will have specialists readily available, Lisa said, and the medical care necessary for her survival.
