

Safe Kids Kansas gives tips for an injury-free holiday

The Fourth of July is a time for celebration across the country, and here in Kansas, fireworks are a crowd favorite each year. Whether at a professional show or in the backyard, fireworks can be fun to watch – but they can also be very dangerous.

In 2007, an estimated 2,600 children ages 14 and under were treated in U.S. emergency rooms for injuries involving fireworks during the fireworks season, from the middle of June until the middle of July. According to the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission, approximately 40 percent of the people injured by fireworks were under the age of 15.

In Kansas, from 2000-2008, there were 21 hospital discharges due to fireworks injuries among children 14 years and younger. During the months of June and July 2008, there were 13 emergency room visits for injuries due to fireworks, among children 14 years and younger. Unfortunately, many fire-
