Dear Heloise: Can you please respond with your DRAIN-CLEANING RECIPE using white vinegar and baking soda? I lost the proportions and don't like using harsh drain-cleaning products. Thank you. - Suzanne S., via e-mail

Suzanne, this is one of my most popular "recipes" for cleaning and freshening the drain. First, pour about 1/2 cup of baking soda down the drain, then follow with 1 to 2 cups of white or apple-cider vinegar. The chemical reaction will cause lots of bubbling and fizzing! Let this work for five minutes or so. Then rinse the drain with hot water for at least 30 seconds, followed by cold water to push everything through the plumbing system. One caveat: Letting the mixture sit longer is not better, and this will NOT remove a clog. Vinegar is a workhorse cleaning product, and I have a sixpage pamphlet with the best cleaning and freshening hints using vinegar. Squelch cooking odors by boiling 1-2 tablespoons of vinegar and 1 cup of water on the stove top. - Heloise



#### Forcing or Nonforcing?

1. Nonforcing. North might have a minimum opening bid and South might have a minimum response, so it would not make sense to treat one heart as forcing. If North wanted to assure another response, he would have to bid two hearts (a jump-shift) over one diamond.

2. Forcing. When the responder (as distinguished from the opening bidder) names a new suit, opener cannot pass. Thus, one heart was forcing, and two diamonds is equally forcing.

3. Nonforcing. A jump-raise by opener is merely invitational, allowing South to pass if he has a very weak hand.

4. Nonforcing. One spade would be forcing, and two spades (a jump-shift) would also be forcing, but three spades is a different kettle of fish. Unless you have a specific agreement to the contrary (such as that three spades in this sequence is a splinter bid, showing shortness in spades), three spades is a pre-emptive bid, pure and simple, and might consist of something like seven spades to the K-Q-J and nothing else. North may therefore pass if he feels game prospects are poor.

5. Forcing. When responder has raised opener's suit and opener then bids a new suit, responder must bid again. Here, North is probing for a game, possibly a slam, so South cannot pass.

6. Forcing. Once South bids over three clubs (which is invitational and not forcing), his side is committed to reaching game. South might have only a game in diamonds, clubs or notrump in mind, or he might be thinking of slam and be marking time to allow North to further define his hand. But whatever South's intentions are, North can't pass until at least a game is reached.
