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Harvest stays steady despite rain

Sporadic rain kept combines out of some Thomas County fields this weekend while other farmers were able to finally get going.

Kansas State University Extension recorded 1.3 inches of rain from a late-night storm Friday, making things soggy in the field Saturday. Flash-flood warnings were issued with that storm, however, Emergency Management Director Susan McMahan said today that no flooding was reported.

Eric Sperber, manager of Cornerstone Ag, said the rain hit some parts of the county more than others and his elevators had steady business throughout the weekend, with far more loads of wheat

coming through than much of last week.

Roger Hale of the Colby Harvest Office said custom crews were able to cut some wheat Sunday, but more rain this morning will delay harvesters to mid-afternoon. Many of the crews, he said, have already moved on to Nebraska and Colorado.

Hale said the yields of the wheat coming in look good except where a few areas got hail in the spring. Sperber said farmers continue to report above-average yields across the county.

Sperber estimated the county to be about 75 percent harvested

Sheriff to provide night security at fair

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The Thomas County Fair Board will be hiring sheriff's deputies for security at night during fair week.

At its Thursday meeting, the board voted to hire one deputy for \$10 an hour from 11 p.m. to 6 a.m. Monday to Friday, July 26 to 30. Board President Mark Anderson said the primary concern is for the expensive farm implements that are displayed on the fairgrounds he said, would be moved out by Saturday afternoon, so a deputy wouldn't be needed that night.
