## County eyes new machine for road signs

Road Supervisor Clair Schrock told Thomas County commissioners last Monday the county could save money by buying a plotter machine, which will make road would the county be able to make signs for less than he can buy

Schrock said new federal regulations require signs on county roads be bigger. Only certain signs, like the "911" signs marking numbered and lettered roads, will have to be replaced, he said, but there are about 1,000 of those

Colby Free Press state risk-management program to buy the machine. He noted that Elk County had received a grant for a sign machine, and said he believes money is available to help counties in this situation.
