





**Don't mess with playtime**

**Dear Dr. Brothers:** My wife and I agree on nearly everything, but there's one point of contention that gets us arguing. I say man was not made to be a machine, and requires ample time to kick back and have fun. She looks at playtime as a waste, and is fond of saying, "All work and no play makes Jack a very rich and happy boy." It drives me crazy! Please give me some ammo to make her see the benefits of having fun! - D.B.

**Dear D.B.:** You don't say whether your wife takes playtime for herself and just wants you to work all the time, or whether she is driven to keep her own nose to the grindstone as well. If work is her prescription for you while she relaxes, I urge you to call her on it and take your own recreation. So, one way to approach this would be to simply ask her if she'd like some help handling the beverages, and what she has in mind. If she makes no mention of alcohol, I would not ask anyone to bring their own. I'd put the friend's feelings first, if I were you.

**Two Ways to Skin a Cat**

Bridge is a game of endless refinements, which is one reason it has so many millions of adherents. There is always something to learn, as shown by this hand where South was in seven spades.

West led a club, and South could see 13 tricks, provided he did not lose a trump trick. This would happen only if one opponent had all five missing trumps, or if West started with the J-9-x-x. Declarer can protect against J-9-x-x in the East hand by cashing the king and then leading to dummy's ace. After West shows out, he can then take the proven finesse against East's jack.

The safety play would have worked perfectly in the actual deal except for one small detail. When South cashed the king of spades, East played the nine on it, and the appearance of the nine diverted South from his original plan. He naturally thought the nine might be a singleton, which would mean that West had started with the J-6-4-3.


To guard against this possibility, South continued with the queen, planning to next finesse against West's jack if East showed out. But West showed out instead, and South went down one.

Declarer could have improved on his chances significantly if he had crossed to dummy initially with a heart or a diamond and then led a low spade from dummy. It is unlikely that East would have played the nine in this case, fearing that West might have the singleton ten and that the nine play would jeopardize a sure trump trick for his side.

Once East played low on this basis, declarer would surely have made the contract. After West followed to the king, South would have led a low spade to the ace, and the cat would have been out of the bag.
