Cross country squads optimistic about year

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Colby High senior sisters Katherine and Katrina Kaus hope to put an exclamation point on their already successful cross country careers this fall.

The girls have a combined five appearances in the Class 4A state championship race – three by Katrina, two by Katherine - in their three years running for the school.

Katrina will be looking to improve on her 27thplace finish at state last year and Katherine will be looking to make it to state after not qualifying for the first time last season. She finished 35th at state as a sophomore.

Katrina was fighting a cold during her last three meets of 2009. She still took first in the Northwest Kansas League Meet and qualified for state at regionals by placing fifth. Katrina finished 23rd her sophomore year. She said she wants to finish in the top 15 or 20, because the top 20 places win a medal.

Katrina said she thinks her team had a chance of winning regionals this year.

"I think we will place high in most meets," she Goodland.

Katrina said she thinks juniors Christina Ostmeyer and Emilea Finley will be going out for the team this year. Finley is a star athlete on the girl's track and field squad.

Senior Sara Martin and junior Andrea Torres will also be returning to the team this season.

The boy's cross country team's top three runners from last year - sophomores John Faber and Dustin Reed and junior Jared Nally - will all be returning. Reed almost advanced to state last year, taking 15th at regionals with a time of 18:27. Nally took third at the league meet.

Coach Bob Mannebach said Reed would be tough this year now that he has one season under his belt.

"What he lacks in size, he makes up with determination and desire," Mannebach said.

Reed said his main goal is to make it to state this year. He added that he thought his team would be really good.

Sophomores Brad Schroeder, Blake McNinch, Henry Schuette will also be returning. Junior Jordan Rasmussen may or may not return, Reed said.
