Thomas County, and she will devote full time to the project.

When completed, the Solomon Forks project will produce 108 megawatts of power with 72, 1.5 megawatt turbines. Construction is expected to begin in 2011. The project should be in operation by the end of 2011 at an estimated \$300 million dollar capital cost.

Expected time of construction is nine months, after a power purchase agreement is signed between Acciona and a power purchaser. Tower height will be 267 feet, with 120 foot long blades for a total height

Kennon clarified that equipment is not sitting and waiting to be put into place. He said his company prefers the equipment be put into use soon after they've been manufactured, but that as soon as they have a power purchaser, they will put in the order for towers, propellers and the turbines, and

they will be on site when they need to be.

Placement of the towers has already been take care of county roads. micro-sighted and the cultural resource ticipates approval from the Kansas State Historical Preservation Office.

She said wind has become a viable industry in the past decade, and Thomas County is considered an ideal location for energy production from wind farms.

However, the biggest hurdle yet to come is finding a customer to buy the energy.

"Acciona has been looking for a power purchaser for Solomon Forks for the past two years," Thompson said, "and now the project has the advantage of maturity in development which should be attractive to buyers. Aerial photos for site surveys have been taken, meteorological towers have been measuring wind, transmission line easements have been in place since 2006, and title work for the land owners is mostly complete, with minimal title clean up left."

He also said Kansas is a part of the Southwest Power Pool and can sell to other states in the pool. So there may be instances that if those states haven't met their require-

ments, they will be able to buy power from

renewable resources in Kansas. 'Google and Walmart also buy directly from renewable power sources," Kennon said. "Acciona is also exploring the opportunity to sell to smaller municipal utilities if need be."

Thompson said that as soon as a power purchase agreement is in place, the project would pretty much be on a slippery slope, meaning it would go fairly fast to reach completion and get energy on the grid.

Both Kennon and Thompson had a positive outlook, and suggested that if the land owners were praying people, a prayer for a purchase agreement soon wouldn't hurt.


