Timmy almost NEVER brought a lunch with him. You see, his mom was sick, and his dad's farm wasn't doing very well, and there just wasn't much food in their house, even on the best of days. So Timmy just pretended that he wasn't hungry, so the other kids wouldn't know that they were really, really poor.

But one day, Timmy was just so hungry. There hadn't been anything for breakfast and not much for supper the night before. 
