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Tame thunderstorm intensifies up north

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Sometimes a storm that doesn't do much over here can get pretty intense down the line, like the thunderstorm Monday that brushed by Colby but laid waste to a McCook, Neb., lumber yard.

The storm dropped .03 to .09 of an inch of rain in Colby about 1 p.m., with winds of 30 to 40 mph. By the time it got to McCook, though, it was strong enough to rip the roof right off a lumber yard.

Meteorologist Scott Mentzer with the National Weather Service office in Goodland said the storm got into an area with more moisture and more unstable air as it moved north from Colby. This intensified See "STORM," Page 3

Mentzer said a microburst of wind tore the galvanized steel roof off Kildare Lumber, on B Street, which is U.S. 6-34 in downtown McCook. The sheets of steel blew onto the highway, knocking over a light pole, striking several parked cars and hitting a passing semitrailer truck. No one was hurt, but the microburst also knocked some bricks off a building and damaged nearby trees.

A microburst is a localized downdraft from a thunderstorm, Mentzer said, caused when a storm has warm, dry air near the ground and more moist air higher, about 15,000 feet. Rain from the higher clouds evaporates as it hits the dry air, causing the

State says tax revenue up in August

TOPEKA - Kansas collected nearly \$38 million more in taxes than anticipated in August, raising hopes that the state can avoid major reductions in its current bud-

The state Department of Revenue issued a preliminary report showing that the state collected \$414 million in taxes during the month. That's 10 percent more than the \$376 million that had been forecast in official revenue 5.3 percent to 6.3 percent on July

Both retail sales and individual income tax collections were stronger than anticipated. The surplus made up for a small shortfall in tax collections in July, the first month were a net \$35 million ahead of expectations.

Democratic Gov. Mark Parkinson saw the latest figures as confirmation that Kansas' economy isn't going to suffer even though the state raised its sales tax from

count for the increase. Parkinson pushed for the tax increase to avoid further major cuts in education, social services and other programs following rounds of the state's 2011 fiscal year.
