## New staff, students come to Golden Plains

Golden Plains, several new students and staff members can be seen in the halls, though Superpredicts that final enrollment numbers will be about the same as last year.

Class sizes range from 11 to 25, including two preschool classes of 14 three-year-olds and 15 four-year-olds, a program the school has had for about 13 years.

Golden Plains High School has a total enrollment of 74 students, though that number is not yet official.

"In our efforts to keep Kansans safe, it is critical that we not only protect the victims of domestic violence but continue to work toward preventing future crimes from occurring," said Parkinson. Adopting a Kansas law regarding strangulation through a separate criminal statute or by including strangulation in the definition of "great bodily harm" in aggravated battery or other appropriate section.

The report also highlighted progress made on past recommendations, including domestic violence legislation, which the Legislature passed and Gov. Parkinson signed into law earlier this year. The new law tracks offenders by placing a domestic violence designation on these cases.

To help the board review and make future recommendations, the governor has made four recent appointments, Joyce Grover, Deborah Moody and Libby Scott, Lawrence and Leigh Liggett, Kansas City.

The board is charged with reviewing all adult domestic violence-related fatalities and describing trends and patterns regarding the facts and circumstances. It then recommends ways to prevent future fatalities and determines if adequate resources and training are in place for those who respond to these
