

# Flu shots available; know your coverage

It may seem that flu season is a long way off, but, as the H1N1 flu pandemic of 2009-2010 showed, it's important to look ahead and understand your health insurance policy when it comes to preventive measures.

A total of 160 million doses of flu vaccine are being produced for the upcoming season, according to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. This year's flu shot will include vaccinations against H1N1, A Perth and A Brisbane strains. The H1N1 vaccina- check to see if there are any doction last flu season was a separate shot, or two shots in some cases.

There will be many opportunities through health clinics and pharmacies to receive the vaccination in Kansas this year. But before you receive your shot, especially in a clinic setting, you should review the following tips about your health coverage:

• Make sure you have your health insurance I.D. card handy. · Know which doctors and hos-

pitals are in your network. • Know how much a doctor's office visit will cost.

• What is your co-payment? Also, find out if there are any coverage limitations that apply to the distribution of the medication.

• What is your out-of-network co-payment? If your area is heavily affected by the spread of a flu outbreak, your regular doctor may not be able to see you in a timely manner. If you have to go out-ofnetwork, be aware you will have to pay a higher co-payment for your office visit and possibly any tests run during the visit.

• Know which pharmacies accept your insurance coverage.

• Know if your policy requires preauthorization from your insurance company before you are admitted to a hospital.

• Make sure you have contact details for your health insurance company available in case you have questions.

• If you have plans to travel, tors or medical facilities in-network where you will be visiting. If not, be aware of your policy's outof-network coverage provisions.

With business insurance considerations, widespread absenteeism in a flu pandemic may not be covered under a company's business interruption insurance because that insurance normally covers only property loss. However, workers' compensation might be affected. Business owners are encouraged to check with their agents or companies regarding their coverage limitations.
