

# Prewash spray might save day

Dear Heloise: You once had a LAUNDRY-SOAP TREATMENT made with dish soap and ammonia. I can't find that recipe. Do you still have it? – Judith Kaluzny, Fullerton, Calif.

Of course, and it's a real money-saving hint, too! Use a clean spray bottle and simply put equal parts ammonia (sudsy or plain), dishwashing (not dishwasher) liquid and water in it. This means, as an example, 1/2 cup of ammonia, 1/2 cup of dishwashing soap and 1/2 cup of water. Make sure you label the bottle. Do NOT use with household bleach or any product containing bleach. Combined, they can cause harmful and toxic fumes.

Just apply the prewash to the stain (from the back of the garment) and let sit a few minutes, then wash immediately. (You can NOT use this and toss in the hamper.) Don't dry - let the item air-dry in case you need to repeat the steps. P.S.: Treat stains ASAP, and you won't have to throw out that favorite garment.

Dear Heloise: Since I live on the West Coast and my family lives on the East Coast, I am always traveling back and forth. I bought two of the daily compartmented pillboxes with snap lids. You are South, both sides vulnerable. The bidding has been: North East South Dble What would you bid with each of the following five hands?

1. Redouble. In standard bidding, it is more or less automatic to redouble with 10 or more points in high cards when your partner opens the bidding and the next player doubles. Support for partner's suit is not required.

Usually the opening bidder passes at his next 1 turn whether or not his right-hand opponent acts over the redouble. After either opponent bids (one of them must in order to remove the redouble), the redoubler next shows the nature of his hand by the type of action he takes. He may double for 2 penalties, raise or jump-raise partner's suit, name 2 a new (forcing), cuebid the opponents' suit or bid some number of notrump.

2. Four hearts. There is a good chance that the opponents can either make a game or sacrifice successfully at five of a minor. The four-heart bid is aimed at making it more difficult for them to make the winning decision. At the same time, there is also a reasonable possibility that partner can make four hearts.

3. One notrump. This indicates a balanced hand of six to nine high-card points. Tactically, it is better to bid now than to pass. If you pass, it will be more difficult to show your balanced distribution and modest high-card strength later on.

The notrump bid allows your partner to go on or not, as he sees fit, because he knows what type of hand you have. It also may silence the next player and thereby deprive the doubler of important information about his partner's hand.


4. Two hearts. After an opposing double, a single raise of partner's suit indicates a relatively weak hand containing trump support. The bid normally shows six to nine points, including distributional values. It is best to show the heart fit early and let partner do the rest. 5. Pass. There is simply no better call avail-

able, so the best you can do at this stage is to pass. Change one of your clubs or diamonds into a spade, and you could then bid one spade over the double. It is true that there is an element of risk at-

tached to the pass, because the next player might also pass, but any other call would be even more dangerous. Remember that if West passes, partner still has another chance to bid if he's unhappy with one heart doubled.



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
