Eagles win big at home

Balanced offense leads to easy win

The Colby High football team ran roughshod over Hugoton in the annual homecoming game, pounding their its opponent 42-2.

Four Eagles scored touchdowns, and senior wide receiver Corbin Stephens caught two touchdown passes. He ended up with 116 receiving yards

Colby jumped all over Hugoton early and often. Senior quarterback Kale Arnberger found Stephens with a pass as he cut across the middle of the field. The receiver sped down the field and into the end zone for a 58 yard touchdown.

"He's a big kid," said Arnberger. "He finds ways to get open."

Sophomore Trek Keck booted the extra point through the uprights to make it 7-0.

Opening the next series, senior linebacker Andrew Flanagin; senior defensive end Rocque Russell, returning from an injury that kept him out of Colby's opener; and Stephens smothered Hugoton's ball carrier for no gain. Hugoton's running game was stuffed on the next two plays and they were forced to punt.

Sophomore running back Beau Brown ran around the left side for a 36-yard touchdown with 5:56 remaining in the first quarter, but Keck's extra-point attempt clanged off the goal posts.

Hugoton got a drive going later in the first quarter. Hugoton ran plays meant to entice the Eagles' defensive ends to go inside, allowing Hugoton's backs to go around them, said senior defensive end Josh Middleton. Hugoton's play calling had the Eagles' a little offbalance and it was able to advance the ball all the way to Colby's one-yard line.

Hugoton It looked like headed for a touchdown, but Colby's defense buckled down and made a huge stand. Josh Middleton came up with a big tackle at the one. Moments later, senior linebacker Logan Middleton, Josh's twin, tackled a Hugoton back for a loss on fourth and two. A few plays later, Colby's quarter-Arnberger said the big stop gave his team a lot of confidence. Flanagin blasted through a hole created by the offensive line and motored 50 yards for a touchdown at the start of the second quarter, but the play was called back because of a holding penalty. This would be a recurring theme for Colby. They ended up having five touchdowns taken away because of penalties. Later on, Flanagin picked off a pass and ran 70 yards for a touchdown, but once again the play was called back due to a holding penalty, this time on senior defensive tackle Nathan Quagliano several yards behind the ball. Senior Katherine Kaus, Katrina's sister, came in 26th with 17:24. Mannebach said she also ran well.

Senior Kayla Hockersmith completed her race in 18:32. It was the first race of Hockersmith's career. The senior recently quit tennis and joined the cross country team. Sophomore John Faber completed the race in 19:32, freshman Reed Stephens, 20; sophomore Brad Schroeder, 21:14; sophomore Blake McNinch, 21:45; and junior Jake Thompson, 22:03.

Mannebach said Stephens had done well for a freshman.

"He will get better as he goes along," the coach added.


The Eagles will play at 7:30 p.m. Friday at Scott City.


