## Regents say enrollment up

TOPEKA (AP) – The Kansas Board of Regents says enrollment at state universities, community colleges and technical colleges increased 1.8 percent this fall compared with fall 2009.

The board says total enrollments at universities, community colleges, technical colleges and the KU Medical Center topped 187,000 students this fall. That's 3,200 more than in fall 2009.

Technical colleges posted the best gain as a group, seeing enrollments rise 5.7 percent. Enrollments at university campuses in-

creased four-tenths of 1 percent. The University of Kansas' main campus in Lawrence saw its enrollment decline 2.1 percent and Kansas State University's enrollment stayed at about 23,600.

Woerpel recalled that Jack had a way of showing just how valuable the simple things in life could be, and that he would show scouts first hand why it is important to conserve the environment to help preserve the natural habitats of wildlife for the enjoyment of future generations, and how he loved taking school children and their teachers on nature walks and teaching them how to identify wild life.

Kriss, or "Old Jack," as his grandchildren and school children fondly called him, had other interests too. He helped introduce chess into Colby Middle School. He quietly and generously contributed time and resources to libraries, public radio and television, conservation groups and disaster aid providers. He humbly refused publicity as the largest single contributor in Kansas to the victims of Hurricane Katrina

He is remembered by his family as dad, grandpa, friend, and

He always had a treat for them, but the trick he wanted in return for the treat was for each of them to learn a poem and to recite it when the family got together at Christmas. John Dryden Kriss, whom I fondly called Old Jack along with my siblings as well as cousins and friends, was an inspiration as both a grandfather and a friend. He had many interests including science, anything that could puzzle the mind, chess, and classical music. However, there was always one interest my grandpa had that he passed to every child and grandchild in his famiy...poetry.

Old Jack could recite many poems by heart. Some of them were famous, such as The House that Jack Built, The Rime of the Ancient Mariner, The Jabberwocky, and The Raven. However, he could probably recite many more obscure rhymes than the famous, and most of them were likely to have deeper meaning. But no matter what the rhyme or who the poet, Old Jack could take simple words and spellbind an audience, keeping they're attention until the boy with the vorpal sword came galumphing back with the Jabberwocky head.

In honor of my grandfather, I would like to use what he taught me about poetry to give a rhyme of my own.

<u>Defining a Man</u>

Tell me how, How to define a man? It takes some time, But anyone can.

Old lack lived most his life caring for animals and land both as a farmer and nature enthusiast. When he bought his property north of town from life-long friends, the Fergusons, he had a dream for a nature-study area, as did they.

Thus he began designing his land into a natural habitat. He purchased more land just west of his own from Julia Ferguson, a friend, with the promise to develop it as nothing except a wildlife area. Then the Ferguson Family donated land to the city adjacent to Jack's property with wildlife habitat in mind.

So, lack provided the trees, materials, and labor to accomplish a wildlife refuge and nature study area on these properties. Those who have and continue to use this area, such as the Boy and Girl Scouts as well as school classes of all ages, are asked simply to leave the area as it was found with the exception of litter. So in other words, "Keep the area clean and natural, even if the trash wasn't placed there by you."

The various scout troups have done several service projects including, but not limited to: Building an outhouse, erecting a flagpole, and the building as well as placement of natural birdhouses throughout the area. Countless scouts have also earned various merit badges in the wildlife area, many of them given by scout master

It brought Jack great joy over the years to lead classes on trips through the area, identifying specimens of plants, as well as animals and insects. Numerous people who have experienced the nature-study area with Jack still recall their trip or trips and continue to use the knowledge he passed on to identify specimens they obtain themselves. Jack spent a majority of his life dedicating his time and efforts into creating and maintaining this wildlife nature-study for the use of various educational purposes.

He continued to develop and maintain these properties for nearly fifty years, turning pastureland into what is known as Ferguson Nature Study Area or Tenderfoot, providing a total wildlife experience for young and old alike. We hope it will continue as such, serving many generations to come.

We will miss you Old Jack, but no matter how far the future takes us, We will continue
