

City gets grant plan for a tornado siren

City Manager Carolyn Armstrong told the Colby City Council on Tuesday that the county commissioners wanted the council to approve a federal grant that would allow the county to pay for a new tornado siren.

The federal government would provide 75 percent of the costs and the city would pay for 15 percent up to a maximum amount of 500 E. Fourth St. which removes \$15,000, Armstrong said. O'Brien is the founder of AllergyKids.com and author of "The

UnHealthy Truth," a mother's Leggo-Eggo waffles, and scramshocking investigation into the dangers of America's food supply and what every family can do to protect itself.
