We expect around 50 competitors from the National Cornhusking Association, whose membership includes the states of Kansas, Nebraska, South Dakota, Minnesota, Iowa, Illinois, Ohio, Missouri and Indiana," said Warren Park of Park Motors, who heads up the contest.

Park said there will be 13 husking categories for team and individual competition, with husking running continuously throughout the day until the competition ends sometime in mid to late afternoon.

He added that the contest rotates among the nine states, and this is the sixth time for Oakley to host the national event. He said the biggest crowds they've had were between 3,000 and 4,000 people, but there will be plenty of parking at the site.

He recalled that one year a bus full of Japanese tourists brought a filming crew to record the American event.

Cornhusking represents an important chapter in American agricultural history and is the oldest method of harvesting corn, he said. It represents tradi-

tional farm skills and farm values of work ethic and self-sufficiency.

Contests began in the 1920s and ended in 1941 when the nation entered World War II. In those days, they would attract from 100,000 to 170,000 spectators. The event was renewed on a smaller scale after the war ended.

There will be plenty of activities during the weekend celebration. Girls Night Out will hold a crafters show from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Saturday in the 4-H building and Farmers Indoor Arena. There will be crafts for sale and concession stands open throughout the day. Fifty crafters have reserved space for

Saturday's activities will end with a banquet and state awards ceremony at 7 p.m. at the Northwest Kansas Educational Service Center, 703 W. Second St. The banquet is open to the public.

A Cornhusking Dance, sponsored by the Oakley Area Pride Committee, will run from 8 p.m. to midnight at the 4-H Building. The cost is \$5 per person. Complete Music will provide deejay service, and concessions will be available.

National awards will be handed out at the contest site on Sunday.

KU gets \$22 million grant to study public school testing

TOPEKA – University of Kan-

sas researchers who want to overnation's public schools have received a \$22 million federal grant to work toward that goal, school officials announced Tuesday. Chancellor Bernadette Gray-

Little said the grant from the U.S. Department of Education, spread over four years, is the largest in the school's 144-year history. The university plans to work with 11 states to develop a new model for standardized tests for special education students.

University officials hope that the project, if successful, will spur an overhaul of standardized testing for all public schools students. They worry that schools have adjusted lessons to "teach solely to the test" and want to move away from a single annual exam in each

Research funded by the latest grant will be conducted by the university's Center for Educational Testing and Evaluation, which already has developed standardized tests for Kansas public schools.

The state Department of Education will participate in the research, along with education departments for Iowa, Michigan, Mississippi, Missouri, New Jersey, North Carolina, Oklahoma, Utah, West Virginia and Wisconsin.

"With this grant, the University of Kansas has an opportunity to improve the quality of education received by countless children," Gray-Little said at a news confer-
