‘Field to Fork’ to help in marketing products

Kansas State University and Butler County Community College are teaming up to offer “Field to Fork and Recipe to Reality – Bringing Your Food Product to Market,” a Nov. 9 conference to give farmers information about commercializing a food product.

The conference will be from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the K-State Research and Extension Sedgwick County education center at 7001 W. 21st St. North in Wichita. Experts in the food processing, regulations, labeling, marketing, distribution and business development will give presentations and be on hand to discuss what it takes to bring a food product to market.

“This is for anyone who is interested in sharing great tastes with the world and making money in the process,” said Tonya Bronlee-we, Sedgwick County Extension educator.

Mark and Nancy Galloway of Blacksmith Coffee Roastery will give a keynote presentation about developing their business in Lindsborg. Other featured presentations include:

- “Food Labeling and Regulation” – David Arvelo, small business representative, U.S. Food and Drug Administration;
- “Best Food Practices” – Fadi Aramouni, food scientist, Kansas State University; and
- “Planning and Promoting Your Food Business” – Kansas Small Business Development Center consultants.

Other presentations are on food trends, the basics of starting a food business, writing business plans, “distributing and marketing food products, and avoiding pitfalls.

Academy to recruit math, science kids

The Kansas Academy of Mathematics and Science at Fort Hays State University will hold a recruitment session for its third class, starting in fall 2011, at 7 p.m. Tuesday, Oct. 26, in the Colby Community College Student Union, Room 106.

The academy, established by the Kansas Legislature in 2006, is a premier early-entry-to-college program in Kansas. It’s a unique residential learning experience that provides exceptional high school juniors and seniors a blend of college-level instruction, a high school diploma and 68 hours of college credit, the option to receive an associate degree on graduation, hands-on research supervised by scientists, leadership development and civic engagement opportuni-

ties, co-curricular and extra-curricular opportunities to develop the whole student, a safe campus and residential environment and trained support staff.

Prospective students must have completed at least two years of high school with distinction in math or science. A composite score of 23 on the ACT or a 1060 score on the SAT is required. Students are chosen based on drive, interest, maturity, stability, and personal and family commitment.
