Lady Trojans sweep Seward on Thursday

The Colby College volleyball team picked up a huge victory on Thursday at the Community Building, sweeping Seward County Community College (25-20, 33-31, 25-17) on Sophomore Night.

If Thursday's match against the Lady Saints from Liberal ends up being the team's last home game, it would be hard to draw up a better finish for the squad's sopho-

The Lady Trojans 33-31 win in the second set took the wind out of Seward's sails. The Lady Saints came out cold in the third set, falling behind 9-3 in the early going. Much to Seward's credit, the Lady Saints mounted a rally later in the set, scoring five unanswered points that cut Colby's lead to 14-

A spike by freshman Nichelle Erskine extended Colby's lead to 17-14. Sophomore Danqi Li and Lubbers simultaneously blocked a Lady Saints' spike attempt, giving Colby a 19-16 lead. The Lady Trojans went on to win the set 25-


Coach Carey Jones said in close matches, her team has either lost or they have fought back and won. She said her team fought back on Thursday.

The Golden Plains High Bulldogs football team lost to Sharon Springs 50-44 in an exciting game on Friday.
