Facts say 2010 a great tomato year

I must report to you today that I am extremely pleased to see the end of the tomato growing season. I would also report that I am already anxious for the arrival of the month of March, 2011, when I will be starting my new tomato transplants for next summer's garden!

But right now, I really don't want to look another tomato in the face for awhile. There are still a few lying around the house, trying to ripen, but I'm trying to ignore them. Of course, they'll taste good soon and I'll start ranting very soon about the total worthlessness of the replicas at the supermarket.

I hope you will agree that it has been a wonderful tomato season. I've never seen anything like it at my house. I planted 32 tomato plants last May 13 and 14, eight each of four different varieties, including Super Tasty, Shady Lady, Prime Beef Goliath and Northern Exposure. From the 32 plants, I harvested 422.8 pounds of fruit, averaging 13.2 pounds per plant. I picked a total of 1,780 tomatoes, which averaged approximately 3.75 ounces each. I canned 21 quarts of tomatoes and 106 pints of stewed tomatoes, which are regular canned tomatoes with a little chopped onion, celery and green pepper added. Also canned were 65 pints of tomato-based salsa. I ate 41 bacon, lettuce and tomato sandwiches and enjoyed fresh sliced tomatoes for dinner some 84 times. (The last two totals are conservative estimates.)

The best-producing tomato variety in my garden this year was one I have planted for the last 12 years, called Super Tasty. It produced slightly over 121 pounds of fruit on its eight vines. It also produced the largest tomato in my



garden, one weighing 18 ounces (1 pound, 2 ounces). Super Tasty tomatoes weighed an average 4.25 ounces per fruit. The home-grown plants were transplanted to the garden on Friday, May 14, and the first one was picked on Wednesday, July 28.

The second best producing variety was Shady Lady. While not a new variety, it was the first time I had planted it. It gave me almost 13 pounds of fruit from its eight plants. Shady Lady was aptly named. The extremely heavy canopy of leaves protected the fruit from the sun and it was sometimes difficult to find the tomatoes in the

year was my long time favorite, one you have heard me rave about for many years, the Northern Exposure. It gave me 96 pounds of fruit, borne on those small threefoot vines, not far behind the top two. And then came the new offering, called Prime Beef Goliath, the 14th of the Goliath family of tomato varieties. I picked a total of 93 pounds of fruit from its eight plants and it quit producing about two weeks before the others.


Bear-proof garbage needed
