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Colby College freshman Kane Lovvorn took first in the 133-pound class at the third annual Daniel Cormier Open wrestling tournament on Saturday at the Colby Community Building.

Lovvorn won two matches against Tyler Hill and Danny Floyd, both from Northwest Kansas Technical College in Goodland, in the round robin format. He beat Floyd in a tiebreaker in the fourth

"Kane wrestled a three-time high school state champion and nationally-ranked wrestler in Floyd," coach David Nordhues said. "Kane kept his intensity up and the pressure on him throughout the match. He wrestled as well as anybody in the tournament."

The wrestlers who participated in the open came from Colby, the University of Northern Colorado, Northwest Kansas Technical College, Fort Hays State University, the Air Force Academy Preparatory School from Colorado Springs, and Metropolitan State College from Denver.

Freshman Marco Tamayo came in second at 125 pounds and freshman Jace Campbell took second at 141 pounds.

Tamayo advanced to the finals by pinning unattached wrestler John Corman and winning a 5-3 decision over unattached wrestler Kenny Ornelas. Tamayo lost to Sam Bauer of Northern Colorado 5-3 in the finals.

"Marco wrestled well today," Nordhues said. "He lost to a tough kid from an NCAA school, but his effort was great all day.'

Campbell beat Cody Hancock of the Air Force Prep 8-4 and scored a 10-0 major decision over Chad Kochenower of Northwest Tech in the semifinals. He lost to unattached wrestler Kevin Clark in 4-2 in the finals.

Freshman Nick Rimpley earned third place at 157 pounds. Rimpley defeated Mark Roundtree of Fort Hays by a 19-4 technical fall in the quarterfinals, before losing 2-0 to Derek Koehn (unattached) in the semifinals. Rimpley rebounded on the consolation side with a 9-7 victory over Sean Gaither (unattached) and a 9-1 major decision over Daulet Aliev of Northwest Tech in the consolation finals.

Freshman Sean Cherry took third at 174. He defeated Garrett Wells of Air Force Prep 8-7 in the opening round, but suffered an 8-5 loss to Anthony Pike of Northwest Tech. Cherry won a 6-2 decision against Wells in the consolation finals.

Freshman Blake Steirert took fourth at 197, finishing with three wins and two losses. Steiert lost his opening match 2-1 to unattached wrestler Nick Bayer, but won his next two matches by fall over Chris Luna (unattached) and Diego Bravo of Northwest Tech. Steiert beat unattached wrestler Cody McAnich 7-5 in the consolation semifinals, but lost to Bayer again by an 8-3 decision in the consolation finals.

Sophomore Fabian Guerrero went 1-1, but defaulted his last match after tweaking his ankle. The team was without sophomore Jerad Schroeder at 140 and freshman Jensen Voss at 184, who didn't wrestle because of injuries. Nordhues said he expects all three to be ready to go at next Saturday's Labette Takedown Tournament in Parsons.

The Trojans will compete next Sunday at the Baker Open, and they will hold a dual with Pratt at 7 p.m. Wednesday, Nov. 10, at the Community

There are already some comparisons between the two quarterbacks.

Smith's scrambling 38-yard pass into double coverage set up a game-tying touchdown in the fourth quarter of San Francis-Broncos in the National Football League's fourth regular-season game in London.

"To compare myself to Brett is doing Brett a disservice," Smith said of the Minnesota Vikings quarterback, who started his 292nd straight game against the New England Patriots.

The Broncos (2-6) got their first touchdown in the third quarter yard after Kyle Orton connected with Brandon Lloyd for 71 yards. Lloyd later caught a 1-yard touchdown pass from Orton, who completed 28 of 40 passes for 369

But Orton also had the only two turnovers of the game. Manny Lawson swatted the ball out of his hand in the fourth quarter, setting up Gore's touchdown run. Then he threw an interception to Shawntae Spencer as time was winding

Lawson also drilled Orton in the co's 24-16 win over the Denver third quarter, knocking him to the ground on a third-down pass attempt. Orton was back in for the next possession.

> "I know it hurt," Broncos coach Josh McDaniels said. "He showed great grit and toughness for us today as a leader and a captain of staying in the game even though I know every time he threw it after that, there was a lot of soreness."
