# Program on genetic selection set for cattle producers Dec. 15

Technology is changing many things in life, in- basic concepts and terminology that will serve as cluding how to select cattle.

'The list of traits producers use in selection decisions is growing as is the accuracy of the information used," said Sandy Johnson, Kansas State University Research and Extension livestock specialist

"Knowing when to start applying some of the available technology and when to wait can be confusing," she said.

Genetic selection of cattle in a DNA world is the focus of a program to be at 10 a.m. Wednesday, Dec. 15, at the AmericInn in Russell. This program is designed to help producers understand the issues and make better decisions about the expanding list of selection tools, Johnson said.

The program will begin with K-State Research sor of beef cattle breeding and genetics, covering Extension, Igenity and Pfizer Animal Genetics.

### Yellow wheat can stem from various causes

Dry weather and other factors easily with only a couple primary fall, the plants may turn yellowish. can cause wheat to be yellowish or roots, then the roots are not extenpale in the fall, instead of a nice, healthy green. When that happens, farmers want to know why, said Jim Shroyer, a K-State Research and Extension crop production specialist.

Shroyer said the common reasons for yellow wheat in fall are:

• Poor root growth. This may be due to dry soils or poor seedbed. If the plants have been emerged for

sive enough to provide nutrients.

• Nitrogen deficiency. Nitrogen deficiency causes an overall yellowing of the plant, with the lower leaves dying from the tips inward. It also results in reduced tillering, top growth and root growth. The causes are insufficient fertilizer, leaching from rains and heavy crop residue.

• Leaf rust or tan spot. If leaf

Fall infections are not common in Kansas.

Tan spot also can cause wheat to turn yellow in the fall. Treating fields in the fall for leaf rust or tan spot rarely pays, Shroyer said, because cold temperatures normally cure the problem.

• Low temperatures. When temperatures are cold at the time wheat emerges, the result can be yellow banding on the leaves. If so, the several weeks and can be pulled rust infects young seedlings in the symptoms should fade away.




