### Military not objecting to wind farms

TOPEKA - Wind energy development in Kansas is facing less military resistance than similar efforts on the West Coast, largely because of effective coordination between developers and government agencies, an Army attorney said Monday.

Speaking to the Joint Committee on Kansas Security, Stanley Rasmussen praised a law approved this year that requires city and county leaders to meet each year with military officials to discuss activities taking place on Army and Air Force bases.

He said most of the best areas in Kansas for wind

development are far from regular flight patterns for military aircraft near training areas and installations.

'So far it hasn't been a major issue," said Rasmussen, regional counsel for the office of the assistant secretary of the Army.

Rasmussen said aside from the chances of aircraft hitting the turbines, there are also issues of radar signals being blocked. The blades can block, reflect or diffuse the radar signals, impeding the ability to
