



## Allergic to real trees?

sus-real Christmas tree debate is likely to center on whether real trees trigger allergies. Winter itself can cause allergy-like symptoms by combining low humidity with closed-tight buildings, "trapped" pollutants, and colds and flu.

"Ironically, most allergists agree that the problem won't be the real tree," said Amy Jordan, horticulturist with Kansas State University Research and Extension. "But, it could be the dust and mold a real tree may bring inside. Of course, allergists also say much the same about artificial trees stored in their original container in attic, basement or garage. In that kind of storage, even the cardboard box can get dusty and moldy.'

She recommends hosing down any tree outdoors before setting it up inside.

"To be extra safe, also wash down real trees' trunk with a 5 percent bleach solution. Then, while your tree dries completely, check how clean your ornaments are," Jordan advised, adding two provisos:

• To keep mold in check and minimize needle drop, make sure real trees exit the house in a timely

A heated part of the fake-ver- manner, determined by the tree's age and how well you keep it hydrated - including how hot your furnace is running.

• Store ornaments and artificial trees in sealed plastic containers.

Jordan said evergreen trees vary by species and variety - not only in looks but also in how they smell. People's reactions to smells vary, too. Horticulturists often recommend the Leland cypress as the least likely to inspire sneezes.

"I'm sure it's no comfort, but an evergreen's odor is an irritant, not an allergen," she added. "It causes the same kind of reaction that some people get from Christmas potpourris, scented candles and fireplace smoke.... air cleaner(s) might provide some relief."

Tree pollen is highly unlikely to be a wintertime allergy trigger in Kansas, Jordan said. The allergen-producing mountain cedar (Ashe juniper) is about the only Christmas tree species known to pollinate in winter, and it occurs south of Kansas, mostly in central Texas.

Christmas this year, chances are you may be disappointed.

Although popular culture has made Christmas almost synonymous with snow, in northeast Kansas a white Christmas comes only about once every five years, says State Climatologist Mary Knapp with Kansas State University Research and Extension.

"December is really a dry month," Knapp said. "Epic, or large, snow storms are usually early or late in the season, meaning November or February and March."

While most of Kansas averages an 11 to 21 percent chance of snowfall on Christmas Eve or Christmas day, Knapp said the Flint Hills area does fare better,
