we read of the actions we would all like to banish, these "works" of the flesh: "...Now the works of the flesh are evident, which are: adultery, fornication, uncleanness, lewdness, idolatry, sorcery, hatred, contentions, jealousies, outbursts of wrath, selfish ambitions, dissensions, heresies, envy, murders, drunkenness, revelries, and the like....'

Eugene Peterson is even more blunt with this same text in The Message: "....It is obvious what kind of life develops out of trying to get your own way all the time: repetitive, loveless, cheap sex; a stinking accumulation of mental and emotional garbage; frenzied and joyless grabs for happiness; trinket gods; magic-show religion; paranoid loneliness; cutthroat competition; all-consuming-yetnever-satisfied wants; a brutal temper; an impotence to love or be loved; divided homes and divided lives; small-minded and lopsided pursuits; the vicious habit of depersonalizing everyone into a rival; uncontrolled and uncontrollable addictions...'

Who would even want to admit these "deeds of the flesh" are part of our lives? And yet they are.

I have a temper. I truly hate to admit it, but I do. Most of us would have to admit the same.

And those who don't agree with me? What about those "rabid Re-

crats." It is simpler to demean and depersonalize those with whom we disagree than to try to find common

ground. When we are unhappy, we seek happiness in ways that are self-defeating, that make us even unhappier. Buying things we do not need,

spending money we do not have, looking for joy in the bottom of a bottle or in the illusion of pleasure with drugs. But I don't understand. Weren't these behaviors supposed to have

a sudden, all on its own. You see, there is no magic wand. Change takes work. And just as we have to work at banishing words from vocabularies, so we have to work at banishing self-defeating behavior from our lives.

Paul calls it "walking in the Spirit." And he describes it in this passage in Galatians as the "fruits of the Spirit."

"But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, longsuffering, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control. Against such there is no law. And those who are Christ's have crucified the flesh with its passions and desires. If we live in the Spirit, let us also walk in the Spirit.'

I appreciate the way Eugene Peterson treats these verses:

"But what happens when we live God's way? He brings gifts

We develop a willingness to stick with things, a sense of compassion in the heart, and a conviction that a basic holiness permeates things and people. As those of Lake Superior State College prove, banishing words

isn't easy. But it can be done. As Paul shows us in Galatians, banishing the works of the flesh is far from easy as well, as is changing our lives for the better. But it can and must be done.


