"That's my intention," Royals manager Ned Yost said. "I won't need my fifth starter until April 15th or 16th, so we'll definitely keep a four-man rotation through the middle of April."

Barring injuries, the four starters appear to be right-handers Luke Hochevar and Kyle Davies and left-handers Jeff Francis and Bruce Chen.

Hochevar is expected to start the season opener, followed by Francis, Davies and Chen.

"I don't like my lefties throwing back-to-back if I can help it," Yost said. "We'll probably break them up in there somewhere."

Yost has said Hochevar, the first player selected in the 2006 draft out of Tennessee, has the stuff to be a consistent 15-game winner in the majors. Hochevar has a 19-32 record with a 5.60 ERA in 69 games in the majors.

Hochevar said he is a different pitcher than early in his career.

"When I first came up, I felt I was a little more finesse," Hochevar said. "I think I came up more of a command guy, trying to induce early contact, which obviously I still do, but now I feel like more of a power guy. My mentality is I'm still attacking the strike zone, still going at them."

vear. Chen, who led the Royals with 12 victories last season, is the only one of the four who had a winning record in 2010. Davies was 8-12 with a 5.34 ERA in 32 starts. Francis, who missed the 2009 season after having shoulder surgery, was 4-6 with a 5.00 ERA in 20 games with the Colorado Rockies.

Vin Mazzaro, who was acquired in a Nov. 10 trade with Oakland for David DeJesus, and Sean O'Sullivan are the leading candidates for the final rotation slot.

"Definitely, there are spots open," Mazzaro said. "It's a battle. In spring training, everyone is playing for a job. The last two years I've been fighting for a spot in Oakland. I came over here and it's the same battle, the same focus."

O'Sullivan, who was 3-6 with a 6.11 ERA in 14 games with Kansas City after being acquired in a July trade with the Los Angeles Angels for Alberto Callaspo, came to spring training 25 pounds lighter.

The Mazzaro and O'Sullivan competition for the final rotation slot could continue beyond spring training. Both could start the season with Triple-A Omaha to keep on a regular routine until the Royals need a fifth starter.

Nate Adcock, a Rule 5 pick from the Pittsburgh Pirates, has not allowed a run and only seven hits in eight innings. He has been primarily a starter in the minors, but the 23-year-old Initially, the Royals tried to right-hander has not pitched get Hochevar to be more of a above Class A. Despite double-digit scoring from a junior and two seniors, the Golden Plains High School boys' basketball team was never able to take the lead in the Class 1A Division II state basketball preliminary game in Hays last Thursday.

This was the first year for Class 1A to be split into two division. The boys entered the tournament as the Palco substate champions, seeded No. 5 with a 14-8 record. This was the fourth time in Golden Plains school history for a boys' team to make the state tournament.

The boys started the tournament playing the No. 4-seeded Kiowa-South Barber Chieftains, who held a 17-6 record.

Senior Devinn Ritter started the game with a single free-throw, but that would be the Bulldogs only point throughout much of the first quarter as the Chieftains pulled ahead to a 12-1 lead before senior Rilee Spresser put in a bucket and the Bulldogs got their offense rolling

With under two minutes remaining in the quarter, Tate Preston put in a three, followed by two buckets from underneath by Cole Christensen to end the quarter with the Bulldogs trailing 17-10.

In the second quarter, both teams put in 14 points to keep the 7-point spread at the half. The Bulldogs got scoring from Christensen, Spresser and Preston. The score stood at 31-24 at halftime.

The third quarter found both teams continuing to play aggressively, but the Bulldogs struggled to get the ball to fall. Christensen posted 7 points along with 2 from Ritter and 1 from Preston. The Bulldogs held the Chieftains to 13 points, but that extended their lead to 44-34 by the end of the third.
