



A Time for Giving

All too often, a result that is really due to poor play is blamed on bad luck. These are the hands that have been known to drive many a dummy

Here is a prime example. South bid the excellent heart slam after North had shown modest values by raising to three hearts.

Declarer won the opening club lead with the ace and immediately cashed the A-K of hearts. The failure of the queen to fall did not yet concern South, since if the opposing clubs were divided 3-2, he could still get home safely by eventually using dummy's fourth club as an entry to 37 the K-Q of spades.

Accordingly, declarer cashed the ace of spades and then played the king of clubs. But when East showed out and refused to ruff either the king or the queen, South could no longer make the slam.

South was quick to blame the defeat on the "terrible" divisions in hearts and clubs, but the outcome was actually his own fault. With proper play, the contract is a virtual laydown from the outset.

To assure 12 tricks, all declarer has to do is be willing to lose a trick to the queen of hearts. After winning the first club, he should cash the heart and spade aces and then lead a low heart to the Regardless of who wins the trick or how the

suit is divided, South cannot be stopped from sooner or later entering dummy with the jack of hearts to discard a club and a diamond on the K-Q of spades. It is true that this approach will cost an overtrick if the trumps are divided 2-2, but that is a small price to pay for ensuring a small slam.
