Crews battle pasture fire near Rexford

spawned by a farmer's disc jumped a county road north of Rexford on Tuesday evening and raced nearly two miles on a strong south wind before volunteers from eight fire departments could corral it.

Rexford firemen responded to the first call about 4:55 p.m., and put their effort into protecting an old farmstead about a half mile north of where the fire started. Rexford Fire Chief Bill Scott said they were able to keep the flames away from that area.

Steve Hirsch of Oberlin, training officer for the Sheridan County Fire Department, said he was on his way to a fire meeting in Hoxie. He saw the fire from the junction of U.S. 83 and K-383 east of Selden. He said he drove west toward the fire and realized the Rexford crew would need help.

Eventually, trucks and volunteers from Colby, Gem, Menlo, Selden, Hoxie, Herndon and Atwood joined the fight, bringing brush trucks, pumpers and a flock of tankers. The Thomas County road crew and Frontier Ag also sent tankers. Farmers came with disks and their own tanks.

Fire chiefs from Thomas and Sheridan counties set up a command post at Roads CC and 35, about a mile west of the oiled Rexford Road. Tankers disgorged their water into four portable tanks holding 10,000 gallons in all so was doing spring field prep on the back and forth from the fire to get bearing on his rig. He told firemen water under a cloudy sky.

After jumping the road, the Colby Free Press fire roared north through a field of corn stubble, then jumped into grass along the North Fork of A fast-moving fire apparently Prairie Dog Creek. Firemen said it jumped a fire line plowed by farmers with disk rigs, and they had to drive back out to the main road and come back into the pasture from another angle to resume the fight.

Rexford firemen, meanwhile, had gone on north to get ahead of the fire. It jumped Road DD and another fire line before crews finally stopped it about a half mile short of the Rawlins County line. That kept it away from an occupied farmstead east of Road 35.

"It got real hot, real fast up there," one fireman said.

The area burned was no more than half a mile wide at any one time, but nearly two miles long, covering grass and fields.

South winds around 25 mph, with gusts to 35, whipped the flames along. The fire jumped a road more than 40 feet across and at least two fire breaks 30 to 40 feet wide, said Sheridan County Fire Chief Ross Carder.

Eventually, the wind seemed to shift a little and drive the fire into the north-south Road 35, where firemen held it. By 7 p.m., crews were beginning to go home after refilling the pumpers from the portable tanks. Colby Assistant Fire Chief Sean Hankin said most fire crews were on the way home by 8:30 p.m.
