



Cosmosphere displays rover

A full scale model of the Mars rover Curiosity is on display at the Kansas Cosmosphere in Hutchinson through Friday, April 29, on loan from NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratories.

Scheduled for launch late this year, Curiosity will take nine months to reach Mars in August 2012.

Curiosity is a mobile laboratory designed to investigate whether conditions have been favorable for life, and to examine clues in the rocks about possible past life. It will roam Mars for nearly two 6:35 a.m. - Arrest warrant years, with a greater range than

Curiosity was named by a sixthgrade Lenexa student, Clara Ma, who submitted a winning essay. As her prize, the 12-year-old won a trip to California, where she was invited to sign her name directly

onto the rover during assembly. Larger than the previous three rovers, Curiosity is about nine feet long and weighs 2,000 pounds. Spirit and Opportunity landed in 2004. They were preceded by So-

journer in 1997. The full-scale model is on display in the Cosmosphere lobby. No admission is required to see it. For information, go to cosmo. org.

In April, 1969, Ernest was united in Marriage to Judy Schlick. To this union were born two sons and two daughters. Ernest is survived by his wife Judy of the home; son Stephen and wife Tracy, children Karly, Kelly and Luke; daughter Christine Mountford husband Mike, children Lauren and Connor; son Norman and wife Heide, children Macen and Haileigh; daughter Jennifer Rall, husband Troy and children Victoria and Sean all of Colby; two brothers, Charles Shull of Sierra Vista, Arizona and Dr. Vernon Shull of Ridgecrest, California; and two sisters, Norma Johnson, Osborne, Kansas, and Rosalie Jacobs, Colby, Kansas. Family gatherings with children and grandchildren were the highlight of his days.

Ernest loved the land and tilled it with great care and pride. Along with farming the land Ernest also raised cattle. He had a "way with cattle", often giving many of them names and talking to them as he checked and counted them almost daily.

As Ernest's health began to fail, he retired from active farming, but continued to keep "an eye" on things, as his sons took over the farming and raising cattle.

Funeral services were held at 10:30 a.m. on Tuesday, April 12, 2011 at the Colby United Methodist Church, Colby, Kansas with Pastor James Mardock officiating; burial followed at Beulah Cemetery, Colby, Kansas with Father Dana Clark officiating. Graveside military honors were provided by Ft. Riley.


