What made Stalin turn into monster?

Several years ago I read two books by Simon Sebag Montefiore, "Young Stalin" and "Stalin: The Court of the Red Tsar.'

Stalin was truly one of history's greatest villains, but what is not generally known about

him is that he was also a first class intellectual, a voracious reader, a poet and a gifted singer. He could be so charming it was hard for people to really believe he would be responsible for the non-stop bloodletting that marked his reign. But he was indeed responsible for it. Not only so, he reveled in it.

Particularly fascinating to me was Montefiore's picture of Stalin's court. After the Russian revolution, the victorious leaders of the Bolshevik revolution, led by Lenin, formed a close-knit community. We know this community as the Kremlin.

It is important to understand that not everyone in the commune was a monster. There clearly were monsters among them, but most of the men and women in the commune were kind and gentle souls, loving and full of integrity.

They were starry-eyed idealists who were attempting to create a heaven on earth. They were trying to do this because they did not believe there was a heaven anyatheists.

In a few years, most of these gentle souls were eliminated. Many were killed; others were imprisoned, sent into exile or cowed into silence. Instead of a heaven on earth they created a hell, and before the evil empire they created collapsed on the ash-heap of history an estimated 20 to 50 million of their countrymen would die not as a result of war, but at the hands of their own government in times of peace.

So, how could this happen? How could an experiment begun with such hope and promise fail so reach him at pastormark@colbymiserably? The answer is simple. A monster, Stalin, took control of the community. But how did Stalin, a gifted and pious choir boy, become a monster? According to Montefiore, it began when he read Charles Darwin's "The Origin of the Species." It was after reading this book that he became an atheist. More ominously, after reading Darwin the choir boy began to evolve into a monster.

Darwin's theories do not do this to everyone who reads or accepts them, but they did have this effect on Stalin. For him the law

of God was replaced with natural selection, and he was quick to realize that natural selection favored

Since then I have spent well-nigh 50 years working on the history of our revolution; in the process I have read hundreds of books, collected hundreds of personal testimonies, and have already contributed eight volumes of my own toward the effort of clearing where else. You see, they all were away the rubble left by that upheaval. But if I were asked today to formulate as concisely as possible the main cause of the ruinous revolution that swallowed some 60 million of our people, I could not put it more accurately than to repeat: "Men have forgotten God; that's why all this has happened."

The psalmist David made a similar observation: "The wicked shall be turned into hell, and all the nations that forget God." -



Tracking system to help fight meth production

For Kansas meth cooks, getting recommendation of a task force a key ingredient for making the illegal drug is about to get more difficult. A new electronic tracking system will keep pharmacies and police informed on who is going store to store, buying the products containing pseudoephedrine, and block the sale for those over the legal limit.

Kansas is the sixth state to adopt the electronic tracking system known as the National Precursor Log Exchange, or NPLEx.

The Kansas Board of Pharmacy has entered into an agreement with Appriss Inc., of Louisville, Ky., to deploy the system in Kansas, at no cost to the state. The move to electronic tracking is the result of the


