

North then had to decide whether to lead a diamond or a club. He finally led a diamond, won by South with the queen.



North had returned the seven of diamonds at trick three, apparently his highest one, thus marking declarer with at least one more diamond. But South was still in doubt. He had a strong

feeling that he should play the club king first. Finally, he turned to East and said: "Please - what system are you two playing?"

South's partner immediately interrupted and said: "Why do you ask such a question? Don't tell me you want to learn this system!" West went down four -1,100.
