

After a months-long investigation, local law enforcement and the Kansas Bureau of Investigation arrested 26 people on drug charges and impounded several vehicles in Colby on Monday and Tuesday, and more may be coming.

Colby Police Chief Randy Jones said the KBI along with police and sheriff's departments from Thomas, Logan, Rawlins and Sherman Counties have been conducting an undercover drug investigation in Northwest Kansas for six months.

Jones said the investigation culminated in a series of search and arrest warrants that were executed Monday and Tuesday. The KBI's Crime Scene Unit van could be seen outside several residences in Colby as investigators and sheriff's deputies made the arrests and searched the homes.

Jones said law enforcement executed five search warrants for illegal drugs and "documents associated with the distribution of illegal drugs." The searches turned up various amounts of illegal drugs and money, which officers seized. About 10 vehicles were seized in connection with the case.

Sixteen arrest warrants were executed, and 10 additional cases were sent to the Logan, Rawlins and Sherman County attorneys, so they could reviewed for possible criminal charges. Jones said the investigation is still ongoing, and more arrests are likely.

Miller was the first to file for the 40th District seat now held by Sen. Ralph Ostmeyer of Grinnell.

The 40th District represents 18 counties in northwest Kansas, including Decatur, Norton, Cheyenne, Sherman, Thomas, Sheridan, Rawlins, Gove, Graham, Greeley, Lane, Logan, Ness, Rooks, Scott, Trego, Wallace and Wichita.

Miller, a farmer-rancher who has been a Norton County commissioner since 1996, said Monday that his commission term would be up in 2012 and he had already decided not to run again.

"Protecting our rural way of life is my No. 1 priority," Miller said. "I want to take my experience as a county commissioner, farmer and small business owner to Topeka to ensure that our voice is being heard. Western Kansas is the foundation that our state was built on, and its health is vital to our longterm economic success.

"Rural Kansas is at a crossroads. We can - and must - do everything in our power to create jobs, protect local services and jump start an aggressive revitalization of the rural communities that this state was built upon. That's what I will be focused on doing, and I

Miller and Beverely have been married for 35 years and have four grown children and nine grandchildren. They also run the bowling alley in Norton.

Miller says that he is a "pro-life" candidate. He attends the Norton United Methodist Church.

In addition to his work on the commission, Miller has served on the state Juvenile Justice Authority, the Community Advocacy Committee and the state Board of Emergency Medical Services. He is a three-term member of the Kansas Association of Counties board and serves on the board of the Kansas County Association Multiline Pool, a co-operative which handles insurance coverage

Sen. Ostmeyer has not yet filed for re-election. He said Monday that he does plan to run for annother term. The state primary election will be Tuesday, Aug. 7, 2012.

Commissioner Miller called to tell him he planned to enter the race, the senator said, but other than that, they have not talked.
