Kiwanis gives award to college radio instructor

Vyzourek was recognized Monday evening during the Board of Trustees regular meeting as the recipient of a prestigious award from the Kiwanis organi-

Vyzourek was selected to receive the 2011 Kansas Kiwanis Peter John Loux Achievement Award. Board Chair Kenton Krehbiel acknowledged Vyzourek for the plaque and monetary award presented by the Colby Kiwanis organization this summer.

The award is an endowed gift established by the late R.C. "Pete" Loux in memory of his son, Peter John Loux (1958-1962), who was fatally injured in an auto accident. Loux was a lifelong advocate for people with disabilities. He used his influence as minority leader of the Kansas House of Representatives to help the nation's first manufacturing facility provide employment for individuals with disabilities. Loux also served on the Cerebral Palsy Research Foundation of Kansas Board of Directors from 1972-2004.

"Joe was nominated for the award by the Colby Kiwanis organization," said Krehbiel. "He was chosen from all state nominees and received the award at the district meeting in Hays.'

The award is given to individuals who have demonstrated exceptional desire and dedication in overcoming the difficulties presented by congenital physical or neurological disabilities.

Vyzourek, a native of Atwood, has been blind since the age of 3 due to complications of a premature birth. In addition to his teaching career, he is a respected radio broadcaster who has received numerous industry awards for his announcing and production skills. He has been named Small Market DJ of the Year three times. After graduating from Colby Community College with a degree in broadcasting, Vyzourek began working at KXXX/KRDQ.

Colby Community College radio instructor Joe He served as operations manager for seven years at KXXX and continues to be the on-air talent from 6 to 9 a.m. weekdays. In addition, he and his wife Becca started a mobile DJ service in 1988.

> "I was surrounded by very helpful people," said Vyzourek. "My parents were supportive and I had several teachers in Atwood who encouraged me along the way. Becca and my children continue to encourage me in my teaching career and other endeavors.

> "I don't give much thought to Joe not being able to see," said college President Steve Vacik. "His skill set is so polished and varied. He reads radio copy, operates and engineers equipment and instructs students, and does these things consistently better than others. To paraphrase something he said at the board meeting, Joe is exceptional not because he is blind but because he is simply Joe – and that's someone others would do well to emulate."

> Being blind did not prevent Vyzourek from participating in many activities in elementary and high school. He was a member of FFA and Student Council. In addition, he played first trumpet in the band and wrestled for the Buffaloes. Vyzourek also helped on his parents' farm with all the usual chores.

> "I've always loved electronics and gadgets," explained Vyzourek. "I actually put together a small transmitter and broadcast around our family farm from the basement beginning in third grade. A few years later I had a two-watt transmitter and continued to have fun being on the radio."

Vyzourek enrolled at Colby after graduating from Atwood High School. His college instructors for the radio program were Jon Burlew and Chris Thomp-

Vyzourek and his wife Rebecca, who is also a graduate of Colby, have two young children.
