# Thank pastors for their caring

Preacher and author Barbara Brown Taylor, There will be a memorial service in her book "Leaving Church," tells of her journey from being an associate pastor in a large downtown Atlanta Episcopal church to becoming a solo pastor in a rural church in northern Georgia.

She was already well known for her writing The family suggests memorials and her preaching and had hoped that escaping the city would give her time for privacy and quiet time away from the spotlight and pressures of city living and serving a city church. But that was not to be. Her reputation followed her and the small under-100 member church "where everybody knows your name" grew to become a two-service-on-Sunday-morning large and still growing church. This was not the kind of church she wanted to serve.

Her desire for quiet and privacy was also not to be. She still had to be always "on," whether in the pulpit on Sunday morning or walking down Main Street. Eventually she decided that the only way she could continue in the ministry was to leave church, to no longer serve as a parish pastor. The pressures were too many, and, for Taylor, the rewards, as wonderful as they were, were still too few. She continued to teach, write and preach, but at her convenience. She had time to walk the foothills of the Georgia mountains, tend her chickens and reclaim her life.

I would urge you to let the pastors in this community know how much you appreciate them. Say "thank you" or send a note letting them know you care. It's amazing how good a kind word can feel after a long committee meeting or a week of too much illness. The words "I appreciate you" can go a long way.

Sometimes when church ministers get together, we try to remind ourselves that pastors are people too. Pastors can forget that, and we wonder sometimes if that might skip the minds of the folks we serve as well. This month share a kind word or offer a small gesture of gratitude, not just to your own pastor, but to other pastors in the community as well. Tell them you care. Let them know that what they do and who they are are important. Pass on a word of thanks. It will mean a lot to the good, good folks who serve this community's churches and its people.
