Golden Plains halted by Wildcat defense

The Golden Plains Bulldogs were stopped by the Wallace County Wildcats in Sharon Springs last Friday in a 6-54 loss. The Bulldogs received the ball to start the game and senior Tyler Stevenson carried for a 20 yard gain. After a fumble for a loss, running back Kalyn Weber had a short gain before a pass was intercepted by the Wildcats on their 17 yard line.

The Wildcats had a difficult time getting the ball snapped, but once they got it they made several successful first downs despite efforts of junior Andrew Luna to intercept their passes. Stevenson stopped Wallace County just short of the goal line but they were able to score on the next play. A successful point-after-touchdown attempt gave the Wildcats an early 0-8 lead.

With the Bulldogs back in possession, Weber made numerous attempts to run the ball only to be brought down by a host of Wildcat defenders. After a couple of first downs by the Bulldogs, Weber had to punt back to Wallace County.

The Wildcats picked up the punt and ran it back over 50 yards but the runner was brought down by junior Jose Bermudez. After a few short gains, Wallace County fumbled the ball, and Bulldog senior Cole Christensen recovered it as the first quarter wound down with the Bulldogs trailing 0-8.

In the second quarter, the Bulldogs were forced to punt. The Wildcats made a few short gains, but were plagued by fumbles. After Weber stopped them for a loss, they were forced to punt back to the Bulldogs.

Although the Bulldogs were constantly pounded, they proved to be resilient, as they never gave up the fight. The Wildcats managed yet another score in the third quarter leading 8-38 at the buzzer.

The Bulldogs continued to move the ball throughout the fourth but just couldn't get it over the goal line. Wallace County managed to cross the goal line twice more in the fourth and kicked field goals for extra points as the game ended 8-52.
