

SLICKVILLE, Pa. (AP) - An alligator has taken up residence in a southwestern Pennsylvania reservoir, but experts say it's likely a discarded pet that won't survive much longer.

Chris Kerr, manager of the Municipal Authority of Westmoreland County – a government-run water company that owns the Beaver Run Reservoir - says security workers spotted the five-foot-long reptile about a month ago. Since then, several members of the public have reported seeing it.


