year and to continue to award scholarships that we've had in the past," Vacik said. "But during this year, revisit that and bring back a policy that's very clear and specific and that will communicate well to our community. It will cost us some money to do that, please understand that."

Alan Waites, vice president of business affairs, said it will cost \$140,000 to \$150,000 for both semesters to vacate this policy.

But it will cost us too if those individuals don't come back next semester," trustee Bill Shields said in response.

Vacik agreed with Shields and expressed his feelings about the situation.

"I don't want anyone to say that we weren't honest and straightforward and did right by our students," Vacik said. "So I think it would be to our benefit to go back and undo, at least temporarily, what we did and then revisit it."

Vacik also said the scholarship committee is working on some very specific guidelines and very specific wording so that when they share this with people, they know exactly what they are talking about.

"Our goal is to try and spread it out as much as we possibly can," Vacik said. "Rather than stacking scholarships and giving lots to a few, we'd rather give lots to

lots. But for now I think we ought to go stacking policy which prohibited direct payback and undo this policy, that would be my recommendation.

Vacik then told the board that they are going to have this all together by the first of the year, hopefully sooner.

Arlen Leiker, board treasurer, said the previous policy was complicated and the college needs to avoid this when revisiting the policy.

"Once we go out and explain it, it's gotta be plain and simple and right now it's not plain and simple," Leiker said.

"It's very cloudy," Shields added.

Leiker also said he wasn't sure what the board should do about the policy.

"I've spent some time thinking about it and I don't have an answer for it right now, Leiker said. "I don't even have a recommendation."

Waites said he agreed with Vacik that the policy needed to be vacated.

"My sense is that it's one of those things we have to do," Waites said. "You know, if the roof caved in tonight we'd have to go

"I think we should do it because it's the right thing to do," Vacik said as several board members echoed his sentiment. "I thing to do."

Waits had a financial report for the board. He said that September expenses are on track, and the college has \$121,000 of open purchase orders that are included in his numbers. The budgetary forecast for 2011-2012 is at \$12.660 million and the year-to-date actual expenses is at \$3,248,298 leaving \$9,411,703 remaining in the budget on Sept. 30. Waites also said the cash flow analysis summary shows that the college started with \$700,000 at the end of August, it brought in \$1.751 million in September and used \$1.641 million, leaving the cash balance at about \$800,000 at the end of September.

"So we improved about \$100,000 at the end of the month," Waites said.

Waites then said that October's cash flow is fairly even and they are making good progress on some of the staffing changes and they are on track toward necessary improvements. Audit work is scheduled for the second half of October for balance of field work and the financial aid audit work is nearly complete.
