

Long-time performer says festival improves every year

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Pickin' on the Plains Bluegrass and Folk Festival sees many bands come back each year, and few musicians have been here longer than guitarist Larry Booth, who helped found the festival.

"Well, I was pretty old when it started," he said, "and I'm pretty old now."

He has a style of playing that he describes as gospel, folk and cowboy ballads, which he said "doesn't change much over the years."

However, Booth said, he's learned new songs over the years. One of his favorites, called "Last Letter Home," is about the Civil War, although it was written recently. Another is an older song called "Cowboy's Lullaby," written by Arlo Guthrie.

"I like songs that tell a historical story,"

he said.

Booth, a solo performer, usually relies on his own guitar and voice during a performance. When attending the festival, though, he will often play with other musicians.

"There are several of us in Colby," he said, who get together to sing and play and accompany each other and just entertain ourselves."

He said he has enjoyed some of the recent changes to the festival. This includes the presence of better-known bands such as Dailey and Vincent, who are coming back for a second year at the festival.

"They're still growing in popularity," Booth said. "I'm really looking forward to seeing them and spending time with them."

Booth will be playing on Saturday afternoon of the homecoming, from noon to 12:30 p.m.
