In 1995, he moved to Sheridan, Wyo., to become the editor of the Sheridan Press. He returned to Kansas in 1998 as the publisher of the Colby Free *Press*. He retired from that position in 2005, but didn't stay that way for long, taking a publishing position with the Norton Telegram later that year.

He retired for good in August, 2009, moving back to Goodland before relocating to Colorado to be closer to his grandchildren. He continued writing, however, penning a column that ran in papers from Goodland to Hays.
