As everyone there knew, I was overjoyed to receive such a blessing. In honor of that event, I’d like to dedicate this column to all the city employees who work daily to serve those in our community.

When I received this delightful can of Spam, being the librarian I am, I wanted to paraphrase quote Dr. Seuss a bit and declare, “I do not like them Sam-I-am. I do not like green eggs and Spam.” Sam-I-am asks the character if he could eat it other places. He says, “I would not, could not in the dark.... I would not, could not, in the rain. Not in the dark. Not on a train. Not in a car. Not in a tree. I do not like them, Sam, you see ... I will not eat them here or there. I do not like them anywhere! (Green Eggs and Ham, pp. 12, 37-39).”

I have eaten Spam on occasion in my life. I had it growing up and did not really appreciate it. When I married my husband, I discovered he had five cans in the cupboard. When we moved to the Philippines four years later, we still had the same Spam. One thing we did not take with us, were the five cans of Spam!

As I was pondering this subject, I decided maybe I did not appreciate the culinary delight I might be missing by not eating this food product. The back of the can says to add it to your Mac and Cheese. Maybe there were recipes to be found in cookbooks in the library. I figured there must be a recipe to help cooks like me enhance and use such food.

The first item I looked in was the “Mom ‘N’ Pop’s Apple Pie 1950s Cookbook,” by Barbara Stuart Peterson. Many military men ate Spam during World War II, so

I figured if anyone had a recipe for Spam this book should. I then looked at “Rare Recipes and Budget Savers (Volumes 1-4, from the Columns of the Wichita Eagle’s Home Town News),” compiled by Frank Good. These books had nothing.

I continued my search by looking in the following items: “Betty Crocker’s 40th Anniversary Edition Cookbook,” by Betty Crocker’s staff; “The Best Barbecue on Earth,” by Rick Browne; “Potluck at Midnight Farm,” by Tamara Weiss; “The Food Substitutions Bible,” by David Joachim; “Kansas Cookbook: Recipes from the Heartland,” by Frank Carey; “5 Ingredients in 10 Minutes or Less,” by Paula Hamilton; and last but not least, “The Librarian’s Cookbook,” by Betty-Carol Sellen and Gloria Brown. None had any mention of Spam.

## Wrong-number call helps Ohio woman having stroke

CUYAHOGA FALLS, Ohio (AP) — A woman who called the wrong number when she suffered a stroke still found help a couple of time zones away.

Loretta Smith, of Cuyahoga Falls near Akron, felt her right side go numb and fell to the floor at her home last weekend.

The 70-year-old Smith said she was able to grab the phone with her left hand and thought she was calling her son. Instead, she was one digit off and reached a man in the Denver area who was originally from northeast Ohio and had kept the same number after he moved.

“It was a woman, and she said ‘I may be having a stroke,’” said Kenny Crater, 28, a sculpture major at Metropolitan State University in Denver.

Crater asked for her name and

address and offered to get help. His 911 call was answered by Broomfield, Colo., police, who transferred his call to Cuyahoga Falls.

Smith was taken to Summa Western Reserve Hospital in Cuyahoga Falls, where it was determined that she had suffered a mini-stroke, said Dr. Joseph Nienaltowski.

Smith said Crater saved her life. “I want this kid to be praised to high heaven,” she said.

Crater said Smith had done her part, too. “I do not feel like I have done anything special,” he said.

“I didn’t save her,” Crater said. “She found me.”
