Heloise Hints from Heloise Windshield needs cleaning

Dear Heloise: I can't seem to CLEAN MY AUTO WINDSHIELD. I have tried vinegar and ammonia, to no avail. When the morning sun hits the glass, I cannot see out. Any suggestions? -J.H., via email

Cleaning the windshield is important, because you do need to see out! Heloise Central checked a few automobile owners manuals and spoke with an auto detailer. They all recommend using ordinary household window cleaner, with a soft cloth, followed by drying with a microfiber cloth. This works for both inside and outside the vehicle, and is best to remove smoke and dust film. If possible, leave windows open to circulate the air. Don't use chlorine-based and disinfectant-type cleaners. They can damage defoggers, electrical conductors and radio antenna pieces. - Heloise





Test Your Play

This excellent problem, published in the British Bridge Magazine many years ago, was comprised by Paul Lukacs, Israeli expert.

West should begin by ruffing the queen-of-20 diamonds lead in dummy (it would be wrong to discard a spade or a heart). He then draws both 22 missing trumps, ending in dummy, and leads the deuce of spades. 23

If South follows suit with the five or six or shows out of spades, West plays his seven and 27 is sure to score the rest of the tricks regardless of 29 which suit North returns after winning the seven of spades. 31

If South produces the eight, nine or ten of 34 spades on the deuce lead from dummy, West wins 35 with the king, returns to dummy with a trump and leads the three of spades toward his hand, plan-37 ning to play the jack if South follows low.

By adopting this line of play, declarer makes the contract in each of the following six cases:

1. If South has no spade higher than the six. 2. If South errs and plays the five or six of spades on the first round of the suit when he holds the eight, nine or ten.

3. If South has the queen of spades, in which case the number of spades he was dealt makes no difference at all.

4. If North has either the singleton or doubleton queen of spades.

5. If the six spades held by North-South are divided 3-3.

6. If the potential heart finesse -- taken as a last resort after the spades fail to divide favorably -wins because South was dealt the queen.

Only if all six chances go wrong would declarer fail to make the slam on the recommended line of play. If they all did go sour, declarer could easily be forgiven if he decided to give up the game for a while.
