Baseball legend tops week's list for new books at the Colby library

We are adding a number of new items this week. The first is entitled "Driving Mr. Yogi: Yogi Berra, Ron Guidry, and Baseball's Greatest Gift," by Harvey Araton.

This book is about famed baseball catcher, outfielder and manager Yogi Berra, who teams up with Ron Guidry, retired lefthanded pitcher for the New York Yankees, as a scout and recruiter for the baseball.

Who is Yogi Berra? Well his real name was Lawrence Peter Berra. He was born in 1925, had a career with the New York Yankees for 19 years. He "was one of only four players to be named the Most Valuable Player of the American League three times and is one of only six managers to lead both American and National League teams to the World Series." Wikipedia also tell us that "as a player, coach or manager, Berra appeared in 21 World Series games. He was elected to the Baseball Hall of Fame in 1972" (en.wikipedia.org/ wiki/Yogi Berra).

The second book is "A Wandering Heart," by Thomas Kinkade. This will be his last book, unless he had one in the pipeline, since Kinkade died Friday, April 6, 2012, at the age of 54. Kinkade always wanted to bring light to the lives of others (see the movie "The Christmas Cottage" that the library has about his life as a young adult). In this book, he and Katherine Spencer bring light when Charlotte Miller and other characters bring their diverse backgrounds and interests to



show what is really important in life. While Kinkade may not write again, Spencer not doubt will, since she is the author of 30 other books. She writes under her real name Anne Canadeo for some of her work (back flap).

The third item is "Angelmaker," by Nick Harkaway. The author studied in Cambridge College, England. Protagonist Joe is a clock repairman. We find in the beginning pages that his father's acclaimed crime against humanity was stealing socks. This, however, is not the full story of his father's life as a gangster. Joe fixes more than clocks and watches. He is known to fix music boxes as well as mechanical toys.

An elderly lady named Edie Banister has been calling him to her house to fix things; in turn, he has helped her with the needed work. Joe believes these are small tests to find out if she can trust him with her true treasure. Joe finds that he, too, has a secret treasure from his grandfather. He must decide just how to handle the interest of others without being taken for a dunce. This book is full of mystery, a time machine and the need to save the world.

Raw milk poses risk

consumers and producers about the risks associated with consuming unpasteurized milk, often called raw milk.

A study by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention indicated that the rate of outbreaks caused by raw milk and products made from it may be 150 times greater than outbreaks linked to pasteurized milk.
