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Thomas County department heads met with county commissioners Monday with concerns ance plans and made a request for some changes.

After the county found a savings of \$135,000, the current insurance policies were renewed in the summer of 2011 with Blue ed, saying they would like to add Cross Blue Shield of Kansas covering major expenses and a health reimbursement account managed by professional insurance consultant Rhonda Fernandez for lower amounts.
