
# Movers and carpet layers work while video collection is growing

The Secrest Foundation gave the Pioneer Memorial Library \$1,362 to purchase DVD-format classic movies and Academy Award-winning movies for families. They gave this to us to help with the arts, music and scholastic needs these items provide. These

## Immunize babies to prevent disease

This week is National Infant cine (HepB) – 80.1 percent Immunization Week. The governor and the Kansas Department of Health and Environment are calling on Kansans to help promote immunizations for children. Without diligent efforts to maintain the immunization rates in Kansas, vaccine-preventable diseases remain a threat to our children.

The National Immunization erage among children aged 19 to 35 months. The survey describes the 2010 coverage estimates for children born January 2007 to July 2009. Kansas ranked higher than the national average in five categories and was the same as the national average for Hepatitis A. Kansas rankings are:



DES MOINES, Iowa – Tyson, a beloved English bulldog, doesn't bite ears like his namesake, boxer Mike Tyson. But he does share a title: champion.

The 2-year-old pup with a fetching face and a winning personality was crowned the winner of this year's "Beautiful Bulldog" pageant Monday in Des Moines,

"He's kind of compact. He's got the one big roll and the spot over his eye," said owner Tyler Motter, of Urbandale, Iowa. "His personality is amazing."

Tyson beat out 49 other pups for the honor Monday in the tonguein-cheek contest, now in its 33rd year, which kicks off festivities at the annual Drake Relays track and

Tyson beat out a cast of costumed and cleverly named charac-

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ters, such as RocketMan, Matilda Rose and Chief McBeef. Applications were submitted for more than 100 dogs, and the field was

whittled down to 50 by a lottery. A panel of judges chose six slobbering pups for the finals. The ones that weren't as lucky as Tyson still competed for titles, such as "Mr. Congeniality" and "Best Dressed.'

The slickest costume award went to Fletcher, who was dressed as a massive barbecue sandwich made famous by Jethro's, a nearby restaurant.

Fletcher's owner, Brad Neal of West Des Moines, said it took roughly 80 hours to put together the unique outfit.

"There's a bun, tenderloin, buffalo chicken strip, cheeseburger, bacon, brisket, fried cheese, buffalo chicken, tenderloin, bun, white cheddar sauce," Neal said. "It was a lot of fun. We had a blast."
