Visit to religious community shows worship in a different light

Two days after Easter, my husband and I set out for Europe, with plans to visit Paris and southern Burgundy in France and Nuremberg

This trip had its beginnings last August when I decided I was going to check off the top item on my Bucket List - you know, that list of things you really want to do before you "kick the bucket." Number one on my list was to visit the Taize Community in France.

I had known about the community for many years but more recently making this trip became a priority. When I mentioned my plan to my husband he suggested we make a real trip out of it, so our post-Easter journey was born.

Taize is a small community in southern Burgundy, north of the city of Lyon. In 1940, the community's founder, Brother Roger, came from Switzerland as a newly ordained pastor in the Reformed Church with the idea of creating a religious community in France. The war was raging and northern France was occupied by the Germans.

Brother Roger's community became a haven for Jews and others who were trying to escape persecution. In October 1942, Brother Roger was warned that his work with refugees had been found out by the secret police, so Brother Roger and his "guests" escaped before the community was raided.

Brother Roger returned in 1944 with five other brothers and the Taize Community began to grow. Today there are about 100 brothers, both Protestant and Roman Catholic, who make up the community. Little by little, young people began coming to Taize as a place for spiritual retreat.

Today, as many as 5,000 young people under 30 come to Taize from around the world for worship and spiritual growth. They stay for a week, worshipping three times a day, and also engaging in small group discussion and

reflection and work in the community with the practical tasks of daily living.

When we were there, we encountered youth from France and Germany and saw at least one bus from the Czech Republic. The young people stay in bunk houses or in tents set up around the community.

Our first worship was Sunday Eucharist. The worship center, the Church of Reconciliation, is a simple wooden building that, when opened fully, offers a worship space about the size of a football field. There are no pews and only a few chairs for the older brothers. There are some simple benches along two of the walls. Otherwise everyone sits on steps or on the floor, or they use simple meditation benches to lean on. On this cold, rainy Sunday the church was full, with at least 85 percent of the worshippers under the age of thirty.

Worship is not fancy. The worship space was dimly lit from candles in the area of the altar or communion table. No grand organ played, no band with guitar, drums and keyboard provided the music. We were the musicians. The music is chanting simple songs based on scripture. We sang in French, English, German, Spanish, Italian, Dutch and Latin. Some songs were four-part harmony, some sung as rounds. A choir of youth led us, but all the singing was done by the entire congregation.

There was a short prayer and scripture readings, and then a time of silence for prayer and rian Church in Colby. She may be reached at meditation. It lasted about 10 minutes. No one 462-6342.

stirred. No papers were shuffled. It was truly a holy silence. Then we all shared communion together and ended with more singing. Even after the final blessing the singing continued as worshippers continued to chant and pray. This worship service may have been the most profoundly spiritual experience of my life.

Before Brother Roger was killed in 2005, after being attacked in evening prayer, he was asked what was it about Taize that attracted so many young people. His answer was simple.

"Among the younger generation across the world a large number of young people are asking 'is there any hope for our future?' With the people we welcome we would like to search together how to find new vitality at the sources of faith, and how to prepare ourselves to live Christ for others.

"In the vocation of our community there have always been two aspirations: to go forward in an inner life, sustained among other things, by the beauty of the community prayer, and to take on the responsibilities to make the earth more fit to live in. Through the young people we meet we are strengthened in this certainty: when faith is lived out, it becomes believable and it is communicated. In the same way, when communication between Christians becomes real, it radiates hope; more than that, it can sustain the search for world peace."

I want to go back, again and again. And I would pray for a deeper sense of Christian unity, so that we use our time seeking to reconcile with one another and sharing and spreading the Peace of Christ, rather than fighting about who is theologically or dogmatically right or wrong. Taize is one place that has offered me the hope that this could be a reality.




