Controversy erupts over victims rights

TOPEKA (AP) - Several Kansas legislators have strongly criticized the state's social welfare agency for proposing changes to the contract with service providwhich could interrupt distribution of about \$2 million in federal aid.

The Kansas Department of Social and Rehabilitation Services has proposed requiring domestic violence victims to undergo psychological evaluations before they receive services. It also wants to limit lifetime services to 18 months and have 90 percent of victims hold jobs after 18 months.

The proposals prompted the Kansas Coalition Against Sexual and Domestic Violence to drop negotiations last week on the contract, saying the changes would jeopardize clients' safety. None of the coalition's 29 partners, which serve 540 clients, has signed contracts with SRS, The Topeka Capital-Journal reported.

Joyce Grover, director of the Kansas Coalition Against Sexual and Domestic Violence, said Thursday that putting job requirements and time limits on services would create problems because the needs of victims are complex and change based on the danger of their situation.

SRS Secretary Phyllis Gilmore, who didn't attend Thursday's hearing, said the agency failed to meet basic accountability standards...

of the Thomas County Sheriff's Department was killed at a roadblock north of Colby trying to apprehend two fugitives wanted for the death of a police officer in Nebraska.

The second, and last, law enforcement officer to die in the line of duty, took place a little over 70 years later. On Sept. 6, 1995, Kansas Highway Patrol Master Trooper Dean A. Goodheart was killed east of Colby on Interstate-70 when he was hicle while conducting a truck inspection.

"1995 was not a good year for law enforcement officers of Thomas County," said Dible. "Besides losing Master Trooper Goodheart, we saw two good friends and fellow officers killed that year. Both of them had previously worked closely with

He said on April 9, 1995, the Chief of Police of Oxford John L. Teter died of injuries sustained in a motor vehicle accident during a vehicle pursuit near Oxford.

And on June 25, 1995, Daniel D. Trail, patrolman with the Beloit Police Department, died during the attempted water rescue of two young men when he was caught in the current and drowned. He had served with the police departments in Colby and Atwood, said Dible.

Dible added that a colleague, Sheridan County Sheriff James L. Johnson, was killed in his office on Oct. 26, 2006, while he was interviewing a distraught person about his deteriorating mental health condition.

"After agreeing to a voluntary commitment to a mental health facility, the individual pulled out a gun and shot Sheriff Johnson were injured, officers of the several items before being shot and killed by a deputy who had

room," explained Dible.

He said that not only have officers died in the line of duty, there have been too many close calls in Thomas County, as well. He described three specific incidents of officers taking action during dangerous cases or who were injured.

The most recent close call was on Jan. 14, 2000, when Cpl. Scott Sitton made a traffic stop on the eastbound ramp at I-70 and K-25 for an illegal turn.

the driver," said Dible. "During the conversation, he became suspicious of the driver's story and asked for permission to search the vehicle, which was granted.

"He found brick-like objects in a bag in the trunk that he believed to be marijuana. Sitton asked the passenger to step out of the vehicle after that, who was the supposed owner of the

"The passenger exited the vehicle, turned away from Sitton and reached into his waistband. Sitton pinned him in the notch of the door to control him. Within seconds, the passenger had drawn a handgun and fatally shot himself.... Investigation later determined the passenger was a federal fugitive and was a drug dealer. The bricks turned

out to be \$3,766,021 in cash." In addition to Sitton's incident, Undersheriff Ben Albright was severely wounded on I-70 west of Colby when he stopped a suspicious vehicle in 1985 following the broadcast of a murder in Grainfield. By the end of the day, two Thomas County citizens were killed and one more was severely wounded, said Dible.

"Although no other officers Thomas County Sheriff's office, Colby Police Department,

temporarily stepped out of the Kansas Highway Patrol, Kansas Bureau of Investigation and numerous other agencies were involved in the response to this dangerous incident."

Last, Dible added that several officers of the Colby Police Department were shot at by a person downtown on May 29, "It was unknown that this per-

son had already shot at a police officer the day before in Nebraska," said Dible.
