Walk Kansas strides into sunset for year

Walk Kansas 2012 is in the history books. This eight-week challenge for a healthier lifestyle had another great year.

This program chalsix-member lenges teams to walk and/or exercise to meet the

basic physical activity guidelines of 2 1/2 hours – 150 minutes – of moderate to vigorous activity per person per week. If each member meets the goal the team will, collectively, walk 423 miles or the distance across the state.

Another facet to the program is having participants record their daily fruit and vegetable consumption. Ninety-three percent of Kansans do not consume the recommended 4 to 5 cups of fruits and vegetables a day. Recording intake makes participants aware and can help them strive to reach the recommended amount.

In Thomas Count we had 57 teams, that's 342 people, walking and exercising for better health. All 57 teams made their goal – a Thomas County first. Congratulations everyone. The 57 Thomas County teams walked and exercised for a record breaking 58,576 miles - that's 878,640 minutes. To put that in perspective, they walked around the earth two and a third times.

Six of the teams took on the additional challenge of making it around the circumference of Kansas, 1,200 miles. Five of the six teams achieved that goal with the sixth team only missing it by 36 miles. Even though not all of them took that challenge, a total of 13 teams recorded more than 1,200 miles, the circumference of Kansas. The top 25 teams all logged over 1,000 miles. Everyone seemed to "step it up" this year.

The Grand Finale will be at 5:30 tonight at the Thomas County 4-H Building. Walk Kansas team members gathered to share a cup of fresh fruit, some conversation and to recognize the top 30 teams. The top 30 teams all received incentive prizes. The top five teams

Facebook said in a regulatory filing that 84 million shares, worth up to \$3.2 billion, will be added to the offering.

The biggest increases come from investment firms DST Global and Tiger Global. Goldman Sachs is doubling the number of shares it is selling. Facebook board members Peter Thiel and James Breyer are also selling more shares.

Founder Mark Zuckerberg isn't increasing the number of shares he's selling.

The news comes a day after Facebook raised the expected price range for the stock to a range of \$34 to \$38 per share, up from its previous range of \$28 to \$35. Also Tuesday, major advertiser General Motors Co. said it would stop advertising on Facebook.

In a filing with the Securities and Exchange Commission, Facebook said current shareholders are now offering approximately 241 million shares, up from about 157 million shares previously.

Even though Zuckerberg isn't increasing the number of shares he is selling, the additional sales will trim his voting control to 55.8 percent from 57.3 percent. That's because he has voting control over some shares now owned by investment firms, which will be sold in the offering.

Facebook has more than 900 million users who log in at least once a month, but it makes only a few dollars per year from each one, chiefly through advertising.
