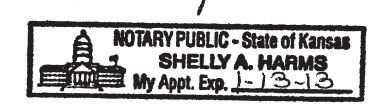

Wheat plot tour planned for June 5

The Thomas County Extension Council will hold its annual wheat plot tour at 7:30 a.m. Tuesday, June 5, at the Solomon Creek Farm of Mike, Jeanene and Tanner Brown, 4 1/2 miles south of the Levant exit on Interstate 70, in the shop on the east side of the road. Mattson Farms is providing rolls and Kansas Wheat Alliance is sponsoring the beverages. Jim Shroyer, Kansas State University Extension agronomist, and Erick DeWolf, an Extension plant pathologist, will speak. Before touring the plots, guests will hear a discussion on stripe rust, barley yellow dwarf, how to identify diseases and wheat farm management data. While touring the plots the

group will view the varieties and their stress levels caused by stripe and leaf rust, as the plot was not sprayed with a fungicide. Shroyer and DeWolf will point out any visible signs of insect, disease or weather damage to help improve crop-scouting skills. This year, the plot tour is about a week earlier than normal due to the early development of the wheat, so plan to attend on June 5. Bring any wheat questions you have or any wheat samples you would like Shroyer or DeWolf to examine. For information, contact the Thomas County Extension Office at 460-4582 or milliman@ksu.edu.

Moved car a clue to teen joyriders

On May 8, Terry Miller came out of his house on Emerson Street in St. Francis and noticed the car was parked in a different place. "I asked Mary Beth," he said, "if she had been up driving in the middle of the night. She answered that she hadn't been." Checking the inside of the vehicle, he found a Walmart sales receipt and sack along with some trash – and they hadn't been to Walmart. To top it off, her purse with identification and a little money was still in the car. There were a few dollars missing but all the credit and gas cards and the driver's license were still there. Taking the Walmart receipt, Cheyenne County Undersheriff Cody Beeson was able to see that the purchase had been made at the Goodland Walmart and the time. He took the receipt to Goodland and store surveillance cameras showed two juveniles from St. Francis making a purchase. The juveniles were both detained and charges have been filed, the undersheriff said.

The two juveniles also took a vehicle belonging to Deanna Forsythe. This time, they didn't bring it back to the owner's home. After putting about 50 miles on it, they parked it in Bobby Hawkins' driveway on Lorraine Street. When Hawkins came home and wanted to park his truck, he called the sheriff's office to have the vehicle removed. That's when they discovered it had also been taken. There have been several other incidents reported but Beeson said the information was vague. The moral to this story is to take your keys out and lock your vehicle. St. Francis might be small-town America where "nothing happens," but occasionally it does.

Teens play dangerous game

WICHITA (AP) – Sedgwick County prosecutors say three teens who faked a robbery at a Subway restaurant in Wichita were playing a dangerous game called "Urban Skittles." A statement from the district attorney's office says the game originated in England. It is played by one or more youths who run into a random business and order everyone to the floor. The youths then count the number of people on the

floor before leaving. *The Wichita Eagle* (bit.ly/KuoVSM) reports that's what happened Monday when a young man walked into the restaurant, put his hand in his pocket and ordered everyone down. Police say two teens with him ran out while he counted the people, then he fled without taking any money. There was no word on whether the youths will be charged.
