Revealing visit to Nuremburg shows human evil and hope in God

Last month I wrote about my visit to the Taize community in southern Burgundy. From there my husband and I travelled to Nuremberg, Germany, for a very different kind of experience.

Most of our trip had been spent visiting various churches, including evening prayer at Notre Dame, Sunday Eucharist at Taize, and touring the ruins of the great abbey church in Cluny, France, the largest church in Europe until St. Peter's was built in Rome.

The one great exception was the Documentation Center - Nazi Party Rally Grounds in Nuremberg. This is the site of Hitler's great endeavor to build a center for Nazi rallies, a stadium to hold 400,000 people, and an area to hold military exercises that would be open to the public. The museum is housed in the unfinished Congress Hall, designed to hold 50,000 people.

The exhibition, "Fascination and Terror," offers exhibits that try to explain the causes and consequences of the Nazi rule. It describes the Nazi Party rallies and explains the fascination they exercised upon the German people.

It also tries to explain what led to the criminal exercise of power and how cultural, political and economic factors were interrelated and allowed Naziism to flourish. It is brutally frank in showing the violent consequences that were inflicted, not only on those the regime scapegoated, but also on the German population as a whole.

From the Documentation Center we travelled back to the Old City of Nuremberg where we spent a great deal of time in three

churches, two Lutheran and one Roman Catholic, all of which suffered major damage in the bombing of Nuremberg by the Allies at the end of the war.

One church we visited was St. Sebald Church. The building of the church began in 1230. Until the Protestant Reformation it was a Roman Catholic Church, but during the Reformation it became a Lutheran Church, as it remains. Throughout the church's sanctuary was a display of photos showing a bit of the church's history during World War II. First shown was a Nazi parade with the church spires in the background, then several photos of the church in ruins after the allied bombing of Nuremberg, and finally the process of rebuilding the church after the war.

Another church, Liebfrauenkirche (Church of Our Lady) offered a different kind of memorial to both its past and future hopes. It stands in the central market place in Nuremberg on the place of an old synagogue. The synagogue

The Germans speak of "Never again," and both the Documentation Center and the Nuremberg churches stand, not only as memorials to a tragic past, but also symbols of hope for a new future. The church in Taize is called the
