Kobach fears Kansas voter confusion

TOPEKA (AP) – Secretary of State Kris Kobach worries that a federal court ruling setting new political boundaries for Kansas will confuse voters.

Kobach said Friday that the districts drawn by three federal judges for state House and state Senate districts are more disruptive than he would have liked.

The judges ruled late Thursday in a lawsuit filed over the Legislature’s failure to reset political boundaries to account for population changes over the past decade.

The secretary of state was a defendant in the lawsuit. He said he’s glad the judges ruled this week because Kansas elections can proceed on schedule.

Councilman Tim Hutfles asked if liability was an issue that had discussed before and Jones said he didn’t think that would be any more of an issue that it is at any other city facility, such as the aquatic park.

Jones said Goodland has signs in the skate park with warnings regarding conduct and alcohol.

Jones and Technology Director Mike Albers told the council the issues they’ve personally had with skateboarders, including one littering.

Armstrong said she’s had people tell her that they won’t take their children to Fike Park anymore because of the boarders’ language.

Police Sgt. Ron Alexander said he thinks their traffic at the park has decreased since school let out because he has been patrolling them and Officer Kent Dible said he’s seeing them more at the pool now.

Councilman Dave Voss asked if they’re causing problems at the pool and Dible said they’ve only had one complaint so far.

Councilman Fred Taylor asked if they were talking about trying to make this a rule on all of the trails once they’re built and Armstrong said they would only be able to put it in effect for trails on property the city owns, but in the future, they could try to have a consensus with the high school and the college about the issue.

The council decided to have Armstrong prepare a resolution for the next meeting, which will be Tuesday, June 19.

In other business, the council:

- Approved the resolution

of appreciation for the service Omar Weber provided as a councilman.

- Held a public hearing for the adoption of the Neighborhood Revitalization Plan, then approved the ordinance for approving and adopting the plan and authorizing the execution for interlocal cooperation with Thomas County.

The council then approved the Neighborhood Revitalization Plan for the City of Colby.

Powerful storms cause damage in Wyoming

working at First State Bank in Wheatland when the tornado hit her property about 8 miles south of town. She and her co-workers were watching it when one woman pointed out it was near Eike’s house.

She said the tornado went right over her house, which was still standing, though battered.

“We lost a camper, it blew out the windows in our house, blew off the shingles clear down to the plywood, but we didn’t lose the roof. We lost our pig barn, and we lost off our big barn, just the door off the barn. How that happened, I don’t know why we didn’t lose the whole barn. All the trees around our place are down,” she said.

Eike said that no one in her family was home at the time. She said that one couple in another house in the area rode out the storm in the basement.

Another man survived the collapse of his house by climbing into his bathtub, *The Casper Star-Tribune* (bit.ly/LA0813) reported. Photographs from the newspaper show an irrigation

pipe wrapped around a post and the roof of a home ripped off.

National Weather Service meteorologist Richard Emanuel said the tornado was one-quarter mile wide and stayed on the ground for much of its 20-mile path from west of Wheatland to northeast of Chugwater. The area is about 60 miles north of Cheyenne.

“It stayed pretty much over open country,” Emanuel said. “It didn’t hit any towns or cities.”

A twister of that size and duration on the ground was unusual for Wyoming, he said.

A Burlington Northern Santa Fe railroad crew reported the tornado struck a stopped train near Wheatland, firm’s spokesman Gus Melonas said. Five empty train cars derailed onto their sides.

Some power lines also were downed, Ruiz said.

Hail the size of golf balls was reported in the Wheatland area, and 2-inch hail was reported in Laramie, National Weather Service meteorologist Tim Trudel said.

Four tornadoes also touched down in Colorado. One dam-

aged at least seven homes in Elbert County, on the plains southeast of Denver. County officials said two homes lost roofs and others had broken windows but they were still assessing the total damage today.

Laura Van Why said she and her husband Dennis, along with their 2-year-old son and two dogs, hid under the stairs of their basement while the storm passed around near Kiowa.

“It felt like forever,” Van Why said. “It was like black out the windows.”

She said they could hear windows shattering and saw glass flying around the basement. When they went upstairs a half hour later, they saw that most of the windows in the back of the house were shattered.

Meanwhile, 2.5-inch hail was reported in El Paso County near Peterson Air Force Base.

Bernie Meier, a weather service meteorologist in Boulder, said a storm that crossed into the state from Wyoming hit the Greeley area with large hail. *The Greeley Tribune* (bit.ly/L8GjxY) reported that crops were damaged and some residents awoke

Friday to the smell of onions, which were pelleted by hail.

Thursday’s storms came as Colorado businesses were cleaning up the mess after a storm system brought about five tornadoes, hail up to 8 inches deep and heavy rain Wednesday night. No serious damage was reported from the tornadoes Wednesday, but snowplows were called out in Douglas County to clear hail, and firefighters in Colorado Springs rescued about 40 people from flooded cars and homes.

Insurers reported receiving several hundred home and automobile claims in Colorado before the new wave of storms arrived Thursday.

The rain provided some help to firefighters who fully contained a 227-acre wildfire in northern Colorado, but the weather initially hurt efforts to control a 6,000-acre blaze in Wyoming’s Medicine Bow National Forest.

Storms passed close to the Wyoming fire but mostly brought gusty winds that fanned the flames. Rain and hail fell later and slowed the growth of the fire but were not enough to put it out.
